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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Govt. Gundadhur P.G. College, Kondagaon was established in the year 1982 and it is recognized under section 2(f) and 12B of UGC Act. It is affiliated to Shaheed Mahendra Karma Vishwavidyalaya, Bastar, Jagdalpur. It has 20 acres' lush green own campus on the National Highway-30 in Kondagaon town. The Kondagaon district is situated in the Bastar division which is a tribal, socio-economically backward and naxal affected area of Chhattisgarh state and thus the progression of youth in higher education is less common. Majority of its people belongs to tribal community and possesses poor educational background. This college is the leading college of Kondagaon District and also the only postgraduate college in the District. Since most of the people from Kondagaon District belong to vulnerable section who are often not able to send their children away from their home district for the higher education and thus the Govt. Gundadhur P.G. College, Kondagaon lifts a load of big expectations of its stakeholders.

Currently, it has Bachelor of Arts program (with 10 combinations), Bachelor of Science program (with three combinations), Bachelor of Commerce program and nine postgraduate programs. Also, the college has an emerging research centre for Sociology which is recognized by the affiliating university and two more research centres for Economics and Chemistry have been approved recently. All the faculty members are highly dedicated and giving their maximum to establish the college as a reputed centre of higher studies at least in the Chhattisgarh state. The IQAC unit, though recently established, is playing a key role in upgrading the college into the next level of education, infrastructure and facilities. NSS unit of the college is well-known in the district for its social activities and grooming the youth for social responsibilities. The college is imparting quality education for empowering the tribal youth so that they recognize and fulfill their roles and responsibilities as equal contributors towards nation building and making India a forerunner on the global map. Through our multidimensional efforts, **we are striving hard to transform the identity of Bastar's youth from Naxalism to Nationalism.**

The youth of tribal and naxal affected area can be empowered by providing the quality education to uplift their social and educational status. They can be brought into the mainstream of development by keeping them engaged in education and social responsibilities.

- Poor research facilities.
- Lack of postgraduate programs in botany, zoology and physics.
- Lack of separate postgraduate labs.

Institutional Opportunity

- The high physical strength and potential, due to rough and tough life style of youth belonging to tribal area, can be utilized in sports by proper training and facilities to get some outstanding results.
- By giving a quality education, social status of the people belonging to socio-economically backward Kondagaon District can be uplifted.
- The college is situated in tribal area so the relatively less explored tribal culture can be studied and thus the research centre in Sociology can be developed as a major platform for tribal research.

Institutional Challenge

- To build up the proper foundation of our students as most of them lack in basic knowledge of their respective subjects due to poor academic environment in tribal area.
- To involve all our faculty members in research.
- To prepare students for competitive examinations like NET/GATE/SET *etc.*

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution is affiliated to Shaheed Mahendra Karma Vishwavidyalaya Bastar, Jagdalpur, Chhattisgarh, and the curriculum prescribed by it is strictly followed. The college provides 04 undergraduate and 09 postgraduate programs. The concepts of parallel education runs deep in our curriculum and college organises seminars, projects, study tours and other academic activities. The academic calendar serves as a planning document for students, faculty, staff and departments and it includes a complete schedule of commencement of classes, internal evaluation, commemorative days, co-curricular activities, tentative examination schedule etc. The college conducts programs as part of syllabus to address the cross-cutting issues on gender equality, environmental issues, human values and professional ethics. The college promotes the use of technology for teaching, learning and information sharing. The feedback on the curriculum is collected from the students, teachers, alumni and parents which is based on few important criteria such as progressive performance of academics and administration, improvement in teaching-learning process, infrastructure and facilities. There are specific committees that make collective efforts to raise the level of awareness among the students.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The most important thing in teaching learning process of the college is the ability of its teachers to create enthusiasm, ignite passion and generate curiosity among the students. The teachers participate in orientation and refresher courses to make their teaching more innovative and effective. The admission process of the college is managed by admission committee which follows the rules of reservation for SC, ST, OBC, women, Divyagnjan and freedom fighter categories as per the Chhattisgarh government. The admission committee is responsible for counseling of students at the entry-level. The admission is based on merit list prepared on the basis of marks of qualifying examination. To cater the diversified need of students various subject combinations are offered in the academic programs so that they can choose the course according to their choice and competence. Academic calendar is properly followed in the college which facilitates the students to be ready accordingly for various curricular and co-curricular activities. The time table provides specific time slot for classes, library, sports and other activities. The institution assesses the learning level of students and arranges remedial classes for slow learners and provides special platforms to fast learners. In the last completed year total 1304 students and 27 teachers were there in the institute. Thus, the average Student-Teacher ratio is 48:1. The policies of the college are totally student centric. All possible efforts are made by teachers to groom the students. Practicals, projects, seminars, assignments, field works, *etc.* are done to make the teaching learning process more effective. ICT based teaching is performed by teachers through interactive board, overhead projector (OHP), computer/laptop based projector and smart phones. Digital platforms like Google Meet, Zoom, Webex, *etc.* are used by teachers for online classes. Also, the teachers suggest students to use online e-resources *viz.* N-LIST, e-PG Pathshala, SWAYAM Online Courses, National Digital Library, *etc.* Internal assessment is very transparent in our college. The students are given answer sheets after evaluation and their queries/objections are properly entertained.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Government Gundadhur P.G. college, Kondagaon, despite being located in the tribal area, is always committed towards the goal of developing the capacity and efficiency of students and teachers through its available limited resources. To achieve these goals, the college strives to engage the students and teachers in research and expansion activities. Presently, a research center for the subject of sociology is functional in the college and 03 research scholars are enrolled for the Ph.D. degree. In this sequence, a total of 10 paper have been published in the UGC approved journals along with 04 book chapters by our faculty members in the specified time period.

For the intellectual and cultural growth of students many activities such as essay writing, painting, speech, quiz, rangoli, debate, singing, dancing, extempore etc. competitions are organized in the college campus while yoga and sports are conducted for the physical growth of students. Various other programs like Plantation, Swachhh Bharat Abhiyan, Blood Donation, Road Safety Awareness, Voter awareness etc. are organised time to time by National Service Scheme unit, Eco- Club and other units of the college. A 7-days camp is organised every year by NSS unit. This is done in rural areas for the various awareness programs. Publication of college magazine 'Srijan' has been restarted from the session 2020-21 for the purpose of unveiling the creative talent of students. With this practice, students get a platform to develop their literary knowledge and creative talent. Using the well-stocked library and equipped laboratories of college, students get updated about their subjects.

Under this criterion, the college is under performing in getting grants for research projects, increasing the number of research supervisors, organizing research based workshops/seminars, receiving awards and collaboration activities. But, the college is striving hard to improve its performance in the above mentioned points.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Our Institution has provided adequate physical and updated academic facilities as per the requirement of college and the need of students. The specific location of the college provides pollution free and natural environment. Our institute ensures adequate availability of physical infrastructure in the form of equipments, books, ICT facilities, consumables, furniture, teaching aids etc.

There are 26 well ventilated classrooms with sufficient seating capacity and proper electrification. Our institution comprises of 11 classrooms, 5 smart classrooms and 10 departmental classrooms. It also has a Principal's chamber, administrative office, seminar hall, IQAC room, girls common room. We have separate hostels for girls and boys. The total campus is under CCTV surveillance.

The college has provision for purified drinking water, ramp facility for differently abled, cafeteria, parking area and rainwater harvesting system.

The college has rich library with 41,286 books. Online access is provided through N-LIST. We have a computer lab with 20 computers for academic purpose.

The college also takes pride in its comprehensive sports and fitness structure. The outdoor sports facilities include a football court, cricket pitch, open space for yoga etc. Indoor arrangements include a badminton court and carom cum chess room. The institute also has a fully equipped gymnasium with latest exercise machines. It has a stage, where various programs are organized and students perform with their talents.

Procurement policies are framed in accordance with the store purchase rules of government of Chhattisgarh to ensure economy, quality and transparency regarding competitive price. A purchase committee of seniors professors is constituted by the principal which goes through the tenders and finalizes the best quotations.

Major maintenance work of college premises is done by college management, students of NSS and staff members and all are very concerned about cleanliness of the campus. The green corners developed by individual dept. are maintained by the related departments.

Student Support and Progression

Once admitted in the college, the student are groomed by providing various facilities in the form of sports, encouragement for participation in co-curricular activities *etc.* Financial assistance is provided to students as scholarships from state government as well as NMDC. To support the poor students for education more than rupees 1,68,56,390 have been sanctioned through various schemes to more than 3394 deserving students in last five year.

The institution publishes its updated prospectus for students' support and progression, which highlights the facilities available in the college, information about different courses, fee structure, college annual calendar, NSS, library, sports, scholarships, various clubs like Red Ribbon Club, Eco Club, Science Club *etc.* The college also publishes annual magazine "SRIJAN" which highlights the students' curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities and provides them a platform for creative writing.

The college also conducts remedial classes for aspiring student and special treatment is provided to slow learners. The college has well established career counseling and placement cell for guiding the students towards a better career and it provides job opportunities through various campus placement drives. Physically challenged students and students from socially and economically weaker sections of the society get fair attention in admission, financial support, remedial coaching and career counseling. For the support and care of girl students, the college has "Women Harassment Internal Prevention Cell". Girls' common room is also there in our college.

Students are motivated to get higher education. Every year approximately 60 to 70 students go for further studies either in our college or other colleges/universities. Students are also informed about various competitive examinations such as NET, SET, GATE, Ph.D. entrance, *etc.* In addition, the institute has various administrative bodies such as grievance redressal committee, library advisory committee, sports committee, NSS advisory committee, anti sexual harassment cell, Anti-Ragging Committee *etc.* Alumni council has been formed in the college which provides financial and non-financial assistance to the students and works to solve their various problems.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Institution vision and Leadership:-

For this, a governing body is formed in the college. The Governing body and the Principal together work towards the designing and implementation of the institutional quality policies. To achieve excellence various institutional practices are done by staff and students . The meeting of students with teachers and HOD is in our regular practice. Admission process, examinations, cultural programs, sports *etc.* are done according to the academic calendar.

Strategy Development and Deployment:-

Our institution has an IQAC to plan the future constructive growth of the institute. Implementation of e-governance is done in areas like administration, finance, student admission and examination.

Faculty Empowerment Strategy:-

Our institution has much effective welfare measure for teaching and non-teaching staff, which are as per government rules. These welfare measures are Provident Fund, NPS, GIS, Casual Leave, Earned Leave, Occasional (festival) Leave, summer and winter vacations *etc.* Computer Literacy workshop is organized for non-teaching staff to make them efficient in the use of computer. Our teachers attend Faculty Development Programs, Orientation Programs, Refresher Courses, national and international conferences and workshops which increase their intellectual efficiency and academic growth.

Financial Management Resource Mobilization:-

The internal and external audit is a continuous process for the transparency and financial accuracy. Proper procedure for purchases is adopted. Quotations are called for and prices are compared. Our college receives funds from government and non-government bodies like UGC, RUSA, state government and Jan Bhagidari Samiti (JBS) for the development of college.

Internal Quality Assurance System:-

Internal quality of the college is assured by IQAC. The initiatives taken by IQAC like basic computer classes, basic knowledge of English and spoken classes are being proved fruitful for our students. The IQAC takes care about the academic, infrastructural and intellectual goals of the college.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college is working well in terms of gender equity and women safety. CCTV cameras, Id-Cards to each students, Women Empowerment and Harassment Prevention Cell, Legal Aid Clinic, Anti-Ragging Committee, Caution board against sexual harassment and Girl's Common Room are the important facilities provided by the college in terms of women safety. NSS unit also efforts for gender sensitization through its various programs.

To save electricity all the old bulbs and tube lights are replaced by LED lights. The college has adopted cost efficient method for solid waste management. Dustbins are kept at various places of college buildings including office and departments. The big sized dustbins are installed outside the college buildings at various places. The waste stored inside the dustbins is transferred to outer dustbins and then Municipal Corporation collects it for recycling process. The chemical wastes are disposed through soak-pit. We have no scope for biomedical wastes, e-wastes and radioactive wastes. Single use plastic is ban in the college campus.

The college has lush green well maintained neat and clean campus with large open land to built area ratio, good for ground water recharge. The main building has rain water harvesting system. There is an Eco Club which spreads awareness regarding environment protection. Plantation is done on the occasion of World Environmental Day, World Ozone Day, *etc.* NSS unit is very active in environmental protection and social activities like water conservation through check dam construction, cleaning at various public places, awareness on corona vaccine, message for social distancing and use of mask and sanitizer, awareness on girls' education, women's health, *etc.*

Basic facilities are also there for Divyangjan. Messages of tolerance, harmony and unity are spread time to time like on the occasion of Independence Day, Republic Day, National Constitution Day, Unity Day, Annual function, *etc.* "Ek Bharat Shresht Bharat" unit is there for cultural exchange. Students and employees are properly sensitized towards constitutional obligations like timely completion of duties, corruption-free practices, voting rights, *etc.* Also, students and staff follow their respective codes of conduct to maintain

discipline and positive environment. College celebrates various commemorative days, events and festivals. Conclusively, the college is adopting proper practices for its overall development.

Extra classes are conducted if syllabus is not completed in prescribed time. Remedial classes are also conducted to improve the performance of students.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

After classroom interactions and internal examinations, the slow and advance learners are identified and then facilitated accordingly. Special attention is paid during classroom teaching to the students learning at a slower pace than the average students. Additional classes are run for the slow learners to resolve their problems/doubts. We explain the slow learners with the help of ICT, models, charts, *etc.* so as to increase their knowledge. For ICT based teaching PPTs, animations, real images, virtual images, *etc.* are used. Very slow learners are suggested to memorize the contents by repetitive writing.

Advance learners are suggested to follow the standard books from library and soft copies of e-books are also provided by the Professors. They are awakened towards competitive examinations like NET, SET, GATE, UPSC, PSC, *etc.* Information of webinars, seminars and conferences are also shared with them to keep them updated and upgraded. They are advised to use online e-resources such as N-LIST, e-PG Pathshala, SWAYAM Online Courses, National Digital Library *etc.* Advance learners of postgraduate level are encouraged to be ready for Ph.D. programme after completion of master programme. Officers of State Services and Union Services are also invited to motivate our students. Recently in the year 2021, two students of our college, namely Rajendra Markam and Guleshwar Markam, have been selected as Assistant professor in Zoology and Botany subjects respectively. Beside this, one student qualified NET examination in Economics and few students qualified SET examination.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The focal point of our teaching learning methods is student. The college provides proficient learning experience to all the students. Doing practical is the most prominent way of experiential learning. Subject based practicals are conducted in the science faculty to realize the students about the scientific facts/principles. With the help of practical they verify the scientific laws and perform quantitative and qualitative analyses based on scientific laws/facts. In the same way, the students of geography are provided the practical knowledge.

Projects, seminars, assignments, field works, *etc.* are the effective ways of participative learning. Students of science faculty are given the opportunities of projects, seminars, assignments and field works. Social science students accomplish the projects based on survey/field work in various social aspects. Departmental seminars based on marketing strategies are organized for the students of commerce faculty.

Faculty members identify academically significant field visits and surveys and get them accomplished. Also, the students are motivated to participate in webinars, seminars and conferences. To develop the sense of social responsibilities in students is one of the prime target of education and therefore NSS unit of the college sensitize the students for social responsibilities through direct participation of volunteers in various social activities. Also, the students are encouraged to participate in national and state level competitive examinations. Problem solving skills are developed in students by providing them the negotiable difficulties. Various approaches are adapted by faculty members such as step by step solving methods, helping students to understand the problems, asking questions with the hint for its solution, isolating misconceptions by the mistakes of students, *etc.*

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

Various ICT tools such as interactive boards, overhead projectors (OHP) and computer based projectors are used by teachers as an interesting, effective and convenient way of teaching and learning process. Power Point Presentations and audio-visual lectures prepared by the teachers are very promising ways for better understanding of students. Smart classrooms and projectors are available in the college for the ICT based teaching learning process. Moreover, the teachers uses their smart phones as ICT based tools. Personal laptops are also used by teachers for teaching purpose.

During lockdown period, the classes were conducted through online mode only and thus the teachers widely used their smart phones for online classes *via* Google Meet, Zoom, Webex, *etc.* which helped us a lot in the smooth functioning of classes. Teachers demonstrated practicals through ICT based tools during that period. While using ICT tools, the teachers use many common as well as subject based softwares for the effective explanation.

Chemistry department uses ChemDraw and ChemSketch softwares to draw the structures of molecules, Gaussian View software to show the 3D structure of molecules and Origin software to draw and edit the graphs.

In the zoology department ICT is used extensively during museum specimen studies. The living animals are shown live on a large screen and then compared with museum specimen morphology. In the present time due to the ban in dissection of animals, the process of dissection of various animals is shown to students through ICT based teaching. ICT is also used to explain various biological process of life science. Similarly, the graphical representations of data, data analysis, diagram/picture study, map study, *etc.* are preferred by our teachers to be explained effectively through ICT. Also, the teachers suggest students to use online e-resources *viz.* N-LIST, e-PG Pathshala, SWAYAM Online Courses, National Digital Library, *etc.* ICT is also used by teachers to screen the lectures of famous Scientists/Professors/Experts from the institutes of National and International repute.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode**Response:**

Internal assessment is done in our college as per the instructions of affiliating University and Department of Higher Education, Chhattisgarh. It is done in the form of unit tests, assignments, seminars, projects, *etc.* which are conducted frequently to get the students ready for final examination. In order to this, half-yearly/per-annual examination is also held.

The unit test is preferably conducted after the completion of each unit. Before internal assessment, various components of the assessment process are explained to the students so that they can score good marks. The part of syllabus or theme for the assessment, seminar or project to be covered in internal examination is informed to the students.

To ensure the fair conduction of assessment two invigilators are assigned to each room. The corrected answer sheets are verified at random by HOD to ensure proper valuation and discrepancy is redressed immediately, if any. After assessment the answer sheets, projects or presentations are shared with students to know their mistakes. They are told about what is missing in their answer/manuscript/project/presentation and how they could have improved their marks. Experiment records are prepared by student for the lab-course and it is regularly checked.

After the assessment remedial classes are arranged for weak students. Due to continuous internal assessment students are becoming aware of their study and better result are being received.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient**Response:**

Though, we have very transparent system for internal assessment, the students are properly addressed if any rightful grievance is there pertaining to the marks obtained in the internal assessment. The evaluated papers related to internal examination consisting of class tests, assignments, projects, *etc.* are returned to the students with detailed remarks and suggestions for the improvement.

Any query of students regarding the evaluation is thoroughly addressed by the respective teacher. First, the unsatisfied students are individually heard and then explained about their marks allotment by respective professor. If any mistake was done by Professor during valuation, it is rectified and the result is updated accordingly. In case the student is still unsatisfied with teacher's valuation, the matter is discussed and resolved by respective faculty in-charge of internal examination. An internal exam committee is formed at college level for the smooth and transparent conduction of examination and thus the problems of students

are finally attained by the committee, if not resolved at faculty in-charge level.

The course outcomes (COs) and programme outcomes (POs) for all programs running in the college are properly understood to all the teachers as well as students. Our college is committed to assist students in learning and practicing. The COs and POs are displayed on college's website to make our teachers and students aware about them. In the IQAC and staff meetings of the college the importance of POs are explained to the teachers. The COs are discussed with students by respective teachers at the starting of academic session first and then time to time as well.

In practical subjects, the students are realized the importance of their COs and POs in industrial analysis/testing/synthesis *via* practical mode. The POs are explained to students of first year of any programme when the academic session starts. The learning outcomes of the course/programme are periodically evaluated through unit tests and half-yearly examinations. Seminars, assignments, projects, field works, *etc.* are also performed in order to ensure the proper attainment of learning outcomes.

The results of internal assessments are analysed and tried to improve by understanding the problems of students. Also, to ensure the fulfillment of aims of these programs, various awareness activities are done by Career Guidance & Placement Cell in which the students are told about the scope of their programs and the correlation of nature of job with their programs.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

The attainment of program outcome and course outcomes are continuously evaluated at various

parameters. On the basis of results of internal and external examinations the course outcomes are directly evaluated. The results reflect the learning outcome of students and thus by analyzing the results, teachers identify the weaker and advance students and then treat them accordingly. The overall results indicate the program outcome in terms of knowledge. The attainment of course outcomes are also evaluated by seminars, assignments, projects, field works, *etc.* The POs are evaluated through employment as well.

The Career Guidance & Placement Cell keeps record of alumni who are appointed in different types of jobs and other employment. The cell is continuously working to make the students aware about the scope of their programs, recruitment procedures for different jobs and job openings at various places. The POs are also evaluated through up-gradation of students in higher studies. The teachers motivate the students to move towards higher studies like postgraduate programme for undergraduate students and Ph.D. programme for postgraduate students and also motivate them to prepare for competitive examinations like, NET, GATE, SET/SLET, UPSC, PSC, *etc.*

Another parameter for evaluation of POs is social awareness. One of the important objectives of all programs is to develop our students as socially aware and responsible citizens. Social awareness in the students is induced and evaluated by NSS unit. Our NSS volunteers have attained a Republic Day Camp (RDC), many Pre-Republic Day Camps (Pre-RDCs) and received a Governor's award in last five years. To ensure the attainment of COs and POs, the teachers are also evaluated by feedback system. A separate feedback for each teachers is received from students and then the teachers are suggested to mould themselves accordingly.

The college has a system for the procurement, utilization and maintenance procedure for managing physical, academic and support facilities. This system is maintained by the faculty members of the institution and skilled staff. At college level, there are different committees to monitor the smooth functioning of the college. - A purchase committee of senior professors is constituted by the principal.
- Tenders are invited from suppliers/dealers.
- The purchase committee goes through the tenders and finalizes the lowest price quotation.
- Purchased items are entered in the stock registers.

Maintenance and utilization :-

- Maintenance of the campus and the infrastructure of the college including the college building, classrooms, laboratories, hostels, seminar hall and gardens are done by the IQAC.
- The building committee looks after the maintenance works.

Laboratory:-

- Well-equipped laboratories are utilized for practicals.
- The college has laboratory maintenance funds taken from private students as- practical examination fees for all departments.
- Lab technicians, lab attendant and class-IV employees maintain equipment and cleanliness.
- Lab materials are purchased from the funds received from RUSA, UGC, Jan Bhagidari Samiti.
- Safety measures are mandatorily maintained.

- Books for UG students are issued in the central library and PG students have departmental libraries.
- A number of journals and magazines are also available.
- Students return the books before the examination and get an NOC.
- A spacious reading room is available for students.
- Verification and maintenance of books is done every year.

Computers:-

- There are total twenty five computers and one laptop. Out of twenty five computers 20 are for student's purpose and remaining are for academic and administrative purposes.
- The computer science department runs BCA courses.
- Information technology is taught at UG level in mathematics, physics and PG level in mathematics subjects.
- Maintenance of computer is done regularly as per requirement and major work is done during the vacation.
- Broadband FTTH internet is available and Wi-Fi units are also set up in the college.
- LAN and internet connectivity is regularly tested.
- Computer softwares are also upgraded by time to time.
- Website of the college is maintained regularly by AMC (Annual maintenance contract) and updated frequently by our faculty members.

5.3.2 Institution facilitates students' representation and engagement in various administrative, co-curricular and extracurricular activities following duly established processes and norms (student council, students representation on various bodies)

Response:

The students of Government Gundadhur P.G. College, Kondagaon has proper involvement and active participation in various types of programs organized by institute such as administrative activities, curricular activities and extra-curricular activities. Various types of committees have been formed in our college for the successful operation of curricular and extra-curricular activities:

(i) Various Departmental Societies:

There are many departmental societies like Chemical Society, Ramanujan Mathematical Society, Commerce Society and Social Science Council. These societies discuss various issues, breakthroughs, challenges, updates, *etc.* related to their respective subjects. The societies also celebrates various commemorative days related to their subjects such as National Science Day, International Mathematics day, World Environment day, Tobacco day, Ozone day, Hindi Diwas, *etc.* These committees organize various competition programs like Quiz, Speech, Essay Competition, Rangoli, Poster making, *etc.* on the occasion of any event.

(iii) Eco Club: Eco club is formed in the college in which President, Vice President, Secretary, Co-Secretary are nominated which works mainly for environmental protection and the responsibility of greenery and cleanliness of the college campus is taken.

(iii) Red Ribbon Club: Red ribbon club encourages students to learn about safe and healthy life style. The club also promotes for blood donation. It spreads the awareness for the control and prevention of HIV & AIDS. The Red ribbon club is a voluntary on-campus intervention program for students. Red ribbon club organizes various program such as educational competition, awareness campaigns and rallies related to human health.

(IV) Sports Committee: For physical and mental development of students a sports committee is there in the college. Different type of games like Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Badminton, Carrom, Volleyball, Basketball, Archery, *etc.* are organized in the college. Many of our students have represented the college at university and state level games.

(V) Cultural Committee: Cultural committee is formed to provide the platforms to develop and groom the singing, dancing and acting potential in students.

(VI) National Service Scheme: A unit of National Service Scheme with 100 volunteers is established in our college in which the students get to learn about the social responsibilities, performing cultural programs, yoga, time management, art of speaking, public relation, *etc.* The personality development of the volunteers is done through regular activities and special camps. 6. Social and moral support:

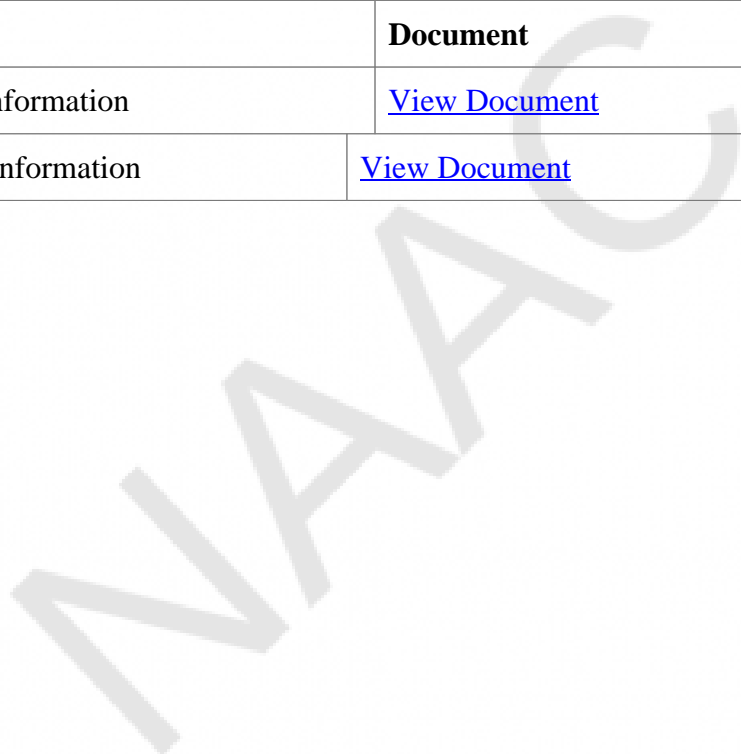
Thus, the Alumni Association supports the students socially and morally. It results in overall development of the college and students.

Response:

- The functioning of college is decentralized through academic departments, IQAC, NSS and various other committees.
- In all the departments, the head of the department takes meeting with the professors of their related departments about the academic planning of the year, the co-curricular activities for students and the skill development of students. 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The institutional Strategic / Perspective plan is effectively deployed

Response:

- College is moving forward strategically for its growth. For the overall growth of college, various strategies/plans are being opted. One of the prime plans is to develop the college for research activities. Though, we were involved in research, we had only one Ph.D. supervisor and related research centre (in Sociology). Two more departments (Economics and Chemistry) had Assistant Professors who were eligible for Ph.D. supervision. We planned to get research centres and Ph.D. Supervisor-ship for both the departments and their related eligible Assistant Professors and motivated all the professors to involve in research. To fulfill this aim, initially we subscribed few offline Journals but it was not cost efficient for us to cover the subscription of good number of journals so switched to e-journals of different subjects *via* N-List. We also purchased practical related equipment for Chemistry Department to facilitate the research. Both eligible professors applied for Ph.D. Supervisor in Shaheed Mahendra Karma University, Bastar, Jagdalpur.
- As a consequence, we got approval for research centres in Economics and Chemistry and thus we have three approved research centres now. Three Ph.D. scholars are registered in Sociology under the supervision of Dr. Kiran Nuruti. Ph.D. Supervisor approval is awaited for other two faculty members and we are hoping to get it soon. Also, one Assistant Professor (Mr. Purohit Kumar Sori) has been registered for Ph.D. degree. We published few papers also in national and international

journals.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

Response:

Our college is governed as per the Chhattisgarh Higher Education Department and University Grants Commission (UGC).

- For the various activities, the college has heads of various departments, library and office under Principal. Under the HOD'S there are Assistant Professors, lab in-charge and lab technician.
- Librarian controls library with the help of Book Lifter. Books are arranged subject-wise. The books are distributed to students. College has a good collection of books of subjects, literature, current affairs and general knowledge and books are purchased every. The records of existing books and their issuance are maintained properly.
- Principal is the head of administrative section of college. Head clerk i.e. assistant grade-1 is responsible to maintain all the office records. The principal ensures timely completion of all responsibilities like salary payment, updating the service book, payment of arrear, maintenance of financial records, admission and examination etc. Office is divided into two section as establishment section/account section and student section. All the departments are supported by supporting staff.
- Regular posts are filled directly by government and the vacant posts are filled by college either as Guest Lecturer (Govt. funded) or as JBS Teacher (College committee funded). The selection is based on merit list prepared on the basis of marks of Master program, NET, SET/SLET, M.Phil. and Ph.D. and full transparency is adopted in the selection procedure.
- Various committees are formed for the planning and execution of academic, administrative, financial and extra-curricular activities. Each committee has an in-charge and its members. These committees include Student Union, Anti Ragging Cell, Cyber Crime Committee, Grievance Redressal Committee, Purchasing Committee, Cultural Committee, Help Desk Committee, Red Ribbon Committee, Amalgamated Fund Committee, *etc.* Objectives of these committees are the smooth and efficient functioning of college in systematic and proper ways.

Job responsibilities and performance expectations are properly understood to all employees and they are motivated to fulfill the objectives by evaluating them based on their performance.

- The performance based appraisal and evaluation system is applicable to all the teaching staff of the college as per UGC's norms. It is carried out in a systematic way with proper format at the end of each academic year. The evaluation is based on Academic Performance Index (API) which includes academic activities, research activities, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The performance is evaluated at multilevel. It is first evaluated by Principal of the college, then by Additional Director, Regional Office of Higher Education and then finally by Commissioner, Directorate of Higher Education, Chhattisgarh.
- Non-Teaching staff including Lab Technicians, Lab Attendant, Assistant Grade-I, II, III and class-IV are assessed as per college performance indicators. They are first evaluated by Principal of the college and then the confidential report is sent to Commissioner, Directorate of Higher Education, Chhattisgarh for evaluation.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Response:

Institution conducts internal and external financial audits on a regular basis. Mechanism for Internal Audit

is as follows:

- Internal audit is a continuous process which is done after each financial year. Physical verification is carried out by college itself in the initial stage of the internal audit. Then internal finance committee verifies the financial data and physical items. Purchase Registers and stock registers are physically checked.
- The internal audit of every department is done for clarity, authenticity, transparency and financial accuracy. Income/Expenditure is closely monitored from Bursar.
- The college internal audit follows the strategy of restraint as far as the expenditure is concerned. The Institution has formed a Purchase Committee for the purpose which opts a proper procedure for purchases. First tenders are published in news papers, then quotations are invited in sealed envelopes, prices comparison chart is prepared and finally work order is given to lowest price quoting firm.
- External audit is done for the funds received from external agencies like UGC, RUSA and JBS (Jan Bhagidari Samiti) Fund. After utilizing the fund, utilization certificate is received, then after completion of project it is audited by Chartered Accountant and finally audit report is submitted to concerned agency. In our college, UGC audit was done during the month of December, 2017 and RUSA audit was done during the months of September 2015, February 2021 and October 2021. During audit, the vouchers and records are properly checked and verified.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The college has proper mechanism to ensure the effective and efficient use of available funds and resources. College receives proposals from different Departments/Units involving all the teaching and non-teaching members of college. The college is having a well-defined and systematic procedure for effective and optimal usage of available resources, infrastructure and other facilities. The resource utilization and fund mobilization are monitored regularly by the head of the institution through statutory committees.

All the financial resolutions of college are regulated and recommended by the different committee members. The final decision is taken in governing body meeting before the starting of new academic session. Principal issues letter to all department for the tentative budget of the expenditure estimation for new academic session. After getting the proposals from different Department/Units including Sports, Library *etc.* the Principal call a meeting for the approval of proposals. The meeting involves all HODs, various committee in-charges, account in-charge, head clerk and Principal. The final commutative proposal is then forwarded to the governing body of the college. The governing body decides the final amount of expenditure and deploy it to various departments/committees of the college. If the expense of any proposed work is less than Rs. 50,000/- then Principal directly permits to utilize the fund and if it's more than Rs. 50,000/- then tender is issued. The major source of fund is the fee collected from students in Jan Bhagidari Samiti (JBS) head. All the expenditures are made by respective departments without compromising the quality.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

IQAC is contributing significantly in the overall development of college. It first finds the need of college in terms of quality in education, infrastructure development, resource development, welfare of students & employees, updation & up-gradation of system, *etc.* and then decides its priorities due to its limited funds. Based on IQAC recommendations, we have established smart classes, enriched our library, modernized our laboratories, developed infrastructure for students and staff, maintained our campus green, neat & clean, student friendly system, *etc.*

It was observed that the college belongs to the tribal area and most of the students are from Hindi medium and also, they have very poor knowledge of Computer Applications. Realising the importance of English language and computer literacy in current scenario the IQAC suggested to conduct skill/personality development programs based on Spoken English and Computer Literacy for students. These two practices recommended by IQAC are mentioned below:

1. Basic Computer classes

In our college the students have very poor knowledge of Computer Applications and computer literacy. So, the IQAC realized that in current scenario the Computer Literacy is must in day to day life. So, the interested students of all streams were listed out, registered and given training for basic knowledge of computer. Mr. Ravi Suryavanshi, Guest Lecturer (Computer Science) took computer literacy classes. The students were trained for mainly MS Office (Word, Excel and PowerPoint), e-mail and online form filling. After the training, the students became able to handle their email, operate computer for general purpose like preparing any contents & reports in MS-Word, filling online forms *etc.*

2. Promotion of basic knowledge of English and English spoken classes

As most of our students are from Hindi medium and they are generally afraid of English language. To remove the fear of English and to motivate them to be friendly with this language it was decided by IQAC to give them English spoken training. In this program, students are given training for spoken English by Mrs. Rupa Sori, Assistant Professor (English). They were taught and plasticized for common sentences of English used in our daily life, basic knowledge of tense, voice and narration, application/letter writing, *etc.* At the end of program, the students were interviewed to check the benefit of program and a fair amount of improvement was observed in their English proficiency as well as confidence. It enhanced the soft skill of students and removed the hesitation inside them.

1. Use of ICT:

- IQAC motivates for ICT based teaching learning including use of Power Point Presentations and audio-visual lectures for better understanding of students.
- Six smart classrooms have been developed and sufficient projectors have also been made available to facilitate the ICT based teaching learning process.
- Seminars and webinars are organized *via* online communication platform in relevance to the educational needs, futuristic view and over all development of the students. In order to this, one International and one National webinars were organized.
- Students are advised to use online e-resources such as N-LIST, e-PG Pathshala, SWAYAM Online

Courses, National Digital Library, etc.

2. Innovative Teaching:

- IQAC suggests innovative teaching learning methods such as Field works, Project works and Demonstrations.
- Students of All the Master programs are guided to make projects and presentations on various topics of subject to enhance the knowledge of subject and to develop the writing skill so that they can be benefited if registered for Ph.D.
- For project, they are taught how to prepare objective, hypothesis and methodologies.
- They are also taught how to prepare questionnaire for survey.
- Students are informed about fundamental tools in research such as research articles, journals, references, Sodhganga, e-SodhSindhu etc. and their uses.

7.1 Institutional Values and Social Responsibilities

7.1.1 Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the last five years.

Response:

The gender equity is promoted and maintained among staff members. Gender equality is also kept in mind while allocating any responsibility to staff members. Even the major responsibilities like superintendent of examination, admission in-charge are given to male as well as female staff members. All the employees are instructed to be gender sensitized in their action as well as behaviour. Also, NSS organizes various programs/activities on women safety, awareness and equality.

Women Empowerment and Harassment Protection Cell is there to ensure the protection of women's right and prevent their harassment. Women safety is a serious concern at any college campus and thus the safety of girl students is also at top priority in our college. It is a common occurrence in rural areas that most of the students come out of their villages for the first time in their life for higher education. College provides a comprehensive range of security and amenity especially for the girl students. For this purpose, the college buildings have been equipped with CCTV cameras.

The Women Empowerment and Harassment Protection Cell organizes seminar for women's awareness time to time. The cell organizes women's day as a big occasion to spread the awareness among the women and boost up their moral. Girl students are given regular information about their rights, sexual assault and its prevention so that they become more aware and alert and do not hesitate in taking preventive and safety actions in case if such disdainful circumstances are encountered in their lives. Because of proper guideline and spreading of awareness no any unpleasant case regarding women appeared in recent years. A legal cell helpdesk is also there to help the students in case of any harassment.

- For solid waste management, dustbins are kept at galleries throughout the college builds, offices and departments. All the staff members and students are advised to use dustbins to manage the solid wastes. Also, the colour coded dustbins are installed in open campus. Green coloured dustbins are used for wet and biodegradable wastes (though very less in campus) such as wastage of lunch box, canteen's items, papers, *etc.* Blue dustbins are used for disposal of non-biodegradable wastes such as plastic wrappers and plastic items, however the single use plastic is ban in campus to minimize the plastic waste.
- Emptying and cleaning of the dustbins are done every day. The wastage of dustbins are handed over to Municipal Corporation for recycling. The Municipal Corporation collects the wastes every day.
- The college has no scope for biomedical waste, e-waste and radioactive waste.
- Plenty of chemicals are released from chemistry laboratory which can be potentially dangerous if combine with drainage system and contaminate the water. Thus, to avoid the surface water contamination from hazardous chemicals released from the chemistry laboratory, a soak-pit is established outside the lab. The soak-pit is directly connected with the drainage system of chemistry lab.

Response:

- “Preamble of the constitution” is displayed on the college building to spread the unity, tolerance and harmony towards various diversities such as cultural, regional, linguistic, communal, *etc.* Also, on the occasion of constitution day on 26th November all the students and employees take oath to follow the preamble of constitution.
- “Ek Bharat Shresht Bharat” programme is being run for the cultural exchanged. Our college is connected with Gujarat state and thus the students were informed about the culture, language and traditions of Gujarat State. Various programs are also organized under same scheme such as on 11.01.2020 oaths were taken in Gujrati language to avoid the single use plastic, to preserve water and to be dedicated to national unity. Garba dance event was organized at college on 29/01/2020.
- We celebrate the National Unity Day on 31st October on the occasion of Birth anniversary of 1st wise primeminister of India Sardar Vallabh Bhai Patel to spread the message of national unity. For example, on 31.10.2019 the message of unity is given by making a human (student) chain in the shape of word “UNITY”.
- Every year on 2nd October, the birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi, message of harmony is spread and the students are sensitized against the untouchability.
- At various occasions we spread the message of tolerance and harmony like in annual function of session 2018-2019, a special program was performed by a group of students in which the students wore the specific dresses of different states and they gave the message of cultural, regional and linguistic unity in the language of associated states.
- Every year during the celebration of Independence Day and Republic Day the students and employees are sensitized towards the values, rights, duties and responsibilities towards the constitutional obligations.

Every year World Environment Day and World Ozone Day are celebrated on 5th June and 16th September, respectively, to make our students and staff members aware about the environmental issues and their possible role in its protection. Hindi Diwas and Chhattishgarhi Rajbhasha Diwas are celebrated to promote Hindi and local languages among students. Bhumkal Diwas is celebrated to recall the contribution of local rebel Amar Shheed Veer Gundadhur in freedom fight. Independence Day and Republic Day are celebrated on 15th August and 26th January of every year to develop the patriotism, to realise the importance of freedom, to pay the respect to our martyrs and to maintain the unity and harmony. Birth anniversaries of freedom fighters like Mahatma Gandhi (2nd October), Subhash Chandra Bose (23rd January), Vallabh Bhai Patel (31st October), *etc.* are also celebrated with same motives.

As AIDS is incurable and transmissible decease, awareness about its protection is must among youth and thus AIDS day is organized on 1st December of every year. At this occasion essay writing, painting and rangoli competitions are held. To develop the scientific temperament and interest in the science and to raise the awareness among the students we celebrate National Science Day on 28th February and Mathematics Day on 22nd December, every year. Women's day is celebrated on 8th March of every year in order to make our girl students and women staff members aware about the sexual harassment any disgraceful act against them. The aim of this program is to boost up their moral, realize their potential and make them bold to raise the voice against any wrongful act against them. Several other national and international commemorative days, events and festivals are also celebrated/organized.

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

Practice-1

- 1. Title of the Practice-**Promotion of use of Information Technology
- 2. Objectives of the Practice-** (A) To upgrade the students for digital age (B) To provide information easily *via* online mode
- 3. The Context-** The college is very sensible for its students especially who are coming from the remote areas of Kondagaon district. Many times, it is unnecessary for them to come to college for various information such as admission date, merit list, class starting date, exam date, *etc.* As these information can be received on fingertips *via* smart phone or computers at their home itself, they are bound to visit the college campus. Also, we feel them to be upgraded with digital age. Therefore, we started the use of Information Technology in our system.
- 4. The Practice-** Information regarding courses offered, merit lists for admission in different courses, required documents and fee for admission, notices regarding annual exam, semester exam, practical exam and various other activities are uploaded time to time on college's website (www.ggckondagaon.in). Also, WhatsApp groups are formed courserwise/classwise to provide the information regarding various activities/events. Moreover, list of contact numbers of all the faculty members and allied staff members is shared with students along with their liabilities.
- 5. Evidence of success-** This practice not only induced students for proper use of mobile/technology but assisted them to get important information timely and without any exertion also. The practice helped our students as well as college administration alot during lockdown period. We could approach our students easily due to this practice and provide all updates regarding their examinations and other events online. The online facilitation helped us in maintaining the minimum physical contacts and thus our students and staff members were negligibly affected by the Covid-19 disease, no Covid-19 explosion was observed among the students and staff members. Because of this practice, we could successfully complete the annual and semester examinations while providing online question paper and format of answer sheet, despite the students belonging to tribal and backward region.
- 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required-** Though, the practice looks very common for institutes belonging to urban area but it was really very challenging for the institute which is situated in remote, backward and tribal area. The major problem we encountered during this practice was that many students had no smart phone with them. As a solution of this problem, they were suggested to use their family member's or neighbour's phone once in a day to watch any updates in college website. Network issue was another major problem, especially during the

lockdown, so they were suggested to search the location for network in nearby area and then check the institute's website and WhatsApp group daily.

Practice-2

1. **Title of the Practice-** Save Electricity
2. **Objectives of the Practice-** (A) Optimum use of electricity. (B) To reduce the power consumption charges. (C) To minimise the utilization of coal used in production of electricity as their sources are limited. (D) To minimise the pollution due to burning of coal.
3. **The Context-** As we know, we are getting electricity at the cost of heavy pollution due to the burning of coal used in the production of electricity. In Chhattisgarh state, the electricity is produced by thermal power plants predominantly which releases significant amount of carbon dioxide causing global warming. Also, the sources of coal are limited and thus they must be used properly for the long term usage. By the use of proper electricity we would be able to minimize our power consumption charges as well.
4. **The Practice-** All the bulbs and tube lights are replaced by LED lights to save the electricity. Also, all the students and employees are given instructions to avoid the unnecessary usage of lights, fans or any other electric device. Notices are stuck at every switch board to put the switches off when not in use. While procuring any electronic devices, low power consumption devices are preferred.
5. **Evidence of success-** Success of our attempts is reflected by significantly reduction in power consumption revealed by data sheet of power consumption in college in last five years. In the calendar years 2017, 2018 and 2019 the total power consumption were 10668, 12609 and 23756 units, respectively while after our practice started from January 2020, the total power consumption in the calendar year 2020 is reduced to 6,655 units and the same in the current calendar year 2021 (till November) it is just 7420. It clearly reveals that our efforts proved fruitful. And obviously, by reducing the power utility we are playing our part positively in the prevention of coal and protection of environment as well.
6. **Problems Encountered and Resources Required-** First, we planned to install solar panels for proper saving of electricity but lack of fund was one of the main issues and thus finally planned to replace all the bulbs/tube lights with LED lights. The college management understood the importance of practice and implemented the plan. Also, it took a lot of efforts to habituate the staff members and students for putting the light/power devices off when not in use. Staff members and students were threatened to impose fine if the instructions are not followed properly.

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust

Response:

Kondagaon is a backward area in terms of education as well as socio-economic condition of its people. It belongs to a remote area of Chhattisgarh and it has been affected by Naxal problem for a long time. Therefore, the students need to be educated with the sense of social responsibility so that they can uplift their community. Thus, the education along with the sensitization for social services is our distinctiveness which is led by NSS unit of our college. We want to bring the youth in mainstream and keep them engaged in productive way. We are determined to groom our students for social services along with providing the quality education. For this purpose, our NSS unit has been continuously working on various social micro-projects, few are mentioned below:

With the help of district administration, the NSS unit organized 7 days residential camp during 03.01.2019 to 09.01.2019 at far remote area Bhongapal which is covered with dense forest, lacking the resources of communication and transport, educationally backward, affected by malnutrition and badly affected by Naxal problem. During the camp, the villagers were given information regarding healthy diets and related government schemes especially for pregnant women and children. They were motivated for education including girl's education. Also, two check dams of sand bags at different locations were constructed on Lutra River at same village during the camp.

In collaboration with UNICEF, the NSS unit organized special camps on 12 villages and made them aware regarding child labour, child trafficking, offences against children and rights of children. Also, **Blue Brigade** was formed by NSS volunteers who spread awareness on domestic violence, good touch bad touch, malnutrition and tri-colour meal *via* rally, poster parade, wall writing and street drama.

NSS unit also organized several programs regarding Covid-19. During lockdown, the NSS volunteers at their own villages run awareness programs on social distancing, sanitizing, mask wearing and hand washing *via* wall writing and social media also. They also distributed mask and sanitizer to villagers. The NSS unit along with Sathi Samaj Sevi Sanstha (NGO) and UNICEF run a "Roko aur Toko" campaign in which the peoples without mask on road/market were stopped and requested to wear the mask and to remove the misperception regarding vaccine. The NSS volunteers visited door-to-door, recorded the statements of vaccinated people and propagated their experience through social media to motivate the feared/misguided people.

At several occasions, the NSS volunteers do cleaning at college campus as well as public places to give the message to keep our surrounding clean. NSS unit frequently organizes such cleaning activities. It also aware the people to minimize the use of single plastic. Under "Abdul Kalam Quality Education" scheme, the children of highly Naxal affected villages Bontikanera, Arungula and Kongud were motivated by NSS unit for education.

The college also shows its sensibility towards social responsibilities time to time. As income of common people was severely affected during lockdown and most of our students belong to economically poor families, the college committee waived off the 50% of admission fee to all the students so that they can continue their study. Professors of the college also support financially to the poor students in the form of fee payment and book donation.

Due to our sincere efforts, our NSS volunteers have attained a Republic Day Camp (RDC), many Pre-

Republic Day Camps (Pre-RDCs) and received a Governor’s award also. Thus, the ‘**Social Service Along with Education**’ is our distinctiveness.

- Our college adopts proper planning for effective curriculum delivery. It follows the academic calendar for the smooth functioning of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. It puts all efforts to inculcate the human values among students.
- The college has well defined student centric education system. The college is highly dedicated for the all-around development of its stakeholders.
- The college is putting considerable efforts to move forward in research activities. Research centres in three subjects have been recognized by the affiliating university.
- It has a fairly good infrastructure. It has proper classrooms (including smart classrooms), a seminar hall with ICT facility, a big playground, a gym, laboratories, *etc.*
- The library lends itself to a quiet and reflective ambience for the students as well the faculty members. It is well stocked with large number of books, e-books and e-journals which are accessed through N-LIST.
- The college practices a well-structured system of mentoring to provide proper guidance to the students in not only choosing the right career path but also to help them to become confident and emotionally secure individuals.
- The college is committed to make students conscious about their social responsibilities through outreach programmes of NSS, to enhance students' social awareness and sensitivity for the upliftment of under-privileged sections of the society.
